[4] The American Indian categories shown represent tribal groupings, which refer to the combining of individual American Indian tribes, such as Fort Sill Apache, Mescalero Apache, and San Carlos Apache into the general Apache tribal grouping.

[5] The Alaska Native categories shown represent tribal groupings, which refer to the combining of individual Alaska Native tribes such as King Salmon Tribe,

Native Village of Kanatak, and Sun'aq Tribe of Kodiak into the general Aleut tribal grouping.

[6] The term "Inupiat" is used in the 2010 Census to classify responses that were classified in previous censuses as "Eskimo."
