Data are based on recommendations from the International Labour Organization (ILO). Employed: Comprise employees, self-employed persons and assisting spouses. In order to be classified as employed, a person must work, i.e. perform labour against some form of payment for at least one hour during the reference period. Unemployed: Persons out of work who are available to start working within two weeks and are actively seeking a job. Not in the labour force: Include young people still pursuing their education and those engaged in work without compensation as Labour force: The sum of employed and unemployed. Figures may not add up because of rounding.

Faroe Islands:

1995-2004: Annual average from registry based unemployment data using estimations of the labour force size. 16-19 years old included in the 20-24 years age group.

From 2005: Labour force survey data. The series are therefore not comparable.

Iceland: Labour force survey data. Estimated data. The move to a continuous labour force survey in January 2003 may cause a break in the series.
